Session Topics

You Care for Kids, Let's Care for Your Future

Childcare professionals spend their days investing in the next generation, but too often their own financial future gets pushed aside. This session highlights the importance of retirement planning and shares simple, practical steps to help you get started. Whether you are a center owner or a staff member, you will leave with greater clarity, encouragement, and actionable steps you can begin right away.

Brains and Boxes - Part 1

This training is part of a 3-part series, Brains and Boxes: An Approach to Classroom Management.

This session introduces a research-based behavior management approach for early childhood classrooms that supports high-quality learning environments, guides behavior, fosters brain development, and builds social-emotional skills. Grounded in a blend of educational theories, this modern approach supports both educators and children while strengthening partnerships with families.

Participants will learn how to set clear classroom expectations, support social-emotional development, and understand behavior as a form of communication. Using

the Brains and Boxes Model and the 6 Sides Method, teachers will gain practical strategies, tools, and resources to confidently implement this approach in their classrooms.

Brains and Boxes Part 2

This training is part of a 3-part series, Brains and Boxes: An Approach to Classroom Management.

In this workshop, participants will learn about common categories of special needs in early childhood and how they are identified, screened, and supported within classroom settings. We will explore community resources available to support children and families, including Early Childhood Intervention (ECI). Participants will also gain practical tools for partnering with families of children with developmental delays or disabilities and learn effective strategies for having sensitive conversations when making referrals.

Brains and Boxes Part 3

This training is part of a 3-part series, Brains and Boxes: An Approach to Classroom Management.

In this session, participants will learn strategies for building strong partnerships with families through effective communication during parent-teacher conferences. They will explore how to document children's growth and behavior to support meaningful conversations about development.

The session also includes research-based information on the four parenting styles and how they influence child development. Participants will learn how to use this understanding to strengthen family engagement, inform lesson planning, and support positive behavior in the classroom.

When Kids Act Up: Supporting Children and their Parents

Children are best supported when everyone who cares for them agrees on how to meet their needs. Most teachers are not privileged to see the home environment their students return to after leaving school each day.

This session will help participants understand the connection between school caregivers and the family home. Teachers are the experts in child development and learning, while parents are the experts on their own child. Participants will learn how to build and strengthen that partnership.

Conscious Discipline - All Day Course

Conscious Discipline is a trauma-informed, evidence-based emotional intelligence program designed for self-regulation. It integrates classroom management with social-emotional learning, focusing on changing adult behavior to effectively teach children how to regulate their own emotions and actions.

Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health

This introductory training explores the foundational concepts of infant and early childhood mental health through an early relational health lens. Participants will gain an understanding of how mental health begins at birth and is shaped through everyday interactions between infants and their caregivers. The session highlights how early relationships and experiences influence brain development, emotional regulation, and lifelong well-being.

Participants will be introduced to key concepts such as attachment, co-regulation, serve-and-return interactions, and the impact of stress on development. The training also emphasizes the importance of caregiver well-being, recognizing that supporting adults is essential to supporting infants.

Grounded in the principles of Early Relational Health (ERH), this session promotes a strengths-based, culturally responsive approach to working with families. Participants will explore how professionals, organizations, and systems play a role in fostering healthy relationships and positive outcomes for young children.

Teaching Every Child: Differentiation Strategies for High-Quality Early Childhood Classrooms

Presented in Spanish: This workshop supports early childhood teachers and program leaders in understanding and implementing effective differentiation practices that respond to the diverse needs, abilities, and learning styles of young children.

Participants will explore practical strategies to adapt instruction, classroom environments, and interactions based on each child's developmental level. The session emphasizes the role of observation and assessment in identifying where children are in their learning and how to provide appropriate support and challenge.

Special attention will be given to inclusive practices, including support for children with diverse learning needs and those receiving or who may need special education services (SPED). Participants will learn how differentiation promotes equity, engagement, and positive outcomes while maintaining high-quality early childhood standards.

By the end of the session, participants will be able to:

Through hands-on, practical strategies—such as color scavenger hunts, nature sound exploration, texture-based play, and movement activities like climbing and balancing—caregivers will learn how to create meaningful sensory experiences that support regulation, coordination, and overall development.

The session also highlights opportunities to incorporate taste experiences through outdoor learning, including gardening, sampling fresh foods, and simple nature-based cooking activities. These experiences help foster healthy habits while deepening children's connection to the natural world.

Participants will leave with a variety of inclusive, easy-to-implement ideas to create enriching outdoor environments that promote learning, health, and wonder through all the senses.

Tiny Humans, Big Connections: Attachment & Development in Infant Classrooms

Infants develop in the context of relationships. In child care settings, providers are not just caregivers—they are attachment figures, co-regulators, and architects of early brain development. This interactive session explores how everyday interactions in infant classrooms shape social-emotional development, secure attachment, and long-term outcomes.

Grounded in infant mental health principles and real-world child care practices, this session will help participants better understand infant cues, co-regulation, responsive caregiving, and relationship-based care. We will explore practical strategies that providers can use immediately to strengthen attachment, support emotional regulation, and create emotionally safe environments for our youngest learners.

Trauma Informed Care in Early Childhood Education

This presentation explores the principles and practices of trauma-informed care in early childhood education. Reconocer y Reportar el Abuso Infantil

Presented in Spanish: Los educadores ingresan a esta profesión porque se preocupan por los niños y quieren que crezcan seguros, apoyados y libres de daño. Aunque puede ser difícil pensar en el abuso afectando a los niños en nuestras aulas, comprender las señales es esencial para proteger su bienestar. Esta sesión ofrece orientación práctica sobre cómo reconocer y reportar el abuso infantil, con información local de profesionales del Williamson County Children's Advocacy Center (WCCAC). Los participantes aprenderán sobre las diferentes formas de abuso, comportamientos comunes de captación (grooming), señales de alerta y síntomas, así como los pasos para realizar un reporte.

Don't Bottle It Up! (Class Capacity 20 Students)

No prior painting experience is needed—this session is designed for all skill levels. Participants will explore creativity, relaxation, and expression while creating a meaningful keepsake and engaging in a supportive, collaborative environment.

- **Social Connection:** Group art experiences foster community, connection, and reduced feelings of isolation.

Following Their Lead: Finding Math in Play, Talk, and Curiosity

Young children build powerful mathematical foundations long before formal instruction. In this session, participants will explore essential precursor concepts—attributes, comparison, change, and pattern—and practice how to “mathematize the day” through play, routines, and joyful interactions.

Using the C.A.I.R. approach (Carefully Attends & Intentionally Responds), participants will learn how to listen closely, respond with purpose, and build rich mathematical language that deepens understanding. Together, we will explore how everyday, child-led classroom experiences can become powerful opportunities for early problem-solving and confident mathematical thinking for both children and adults.

Seguridad Corporal para Cuidadores

Presented in Spanish: Todos queremos que nuestros hijos estén seguros, por eso les enseñamos muchas reglas de seguridad: desde mirar a ambos lados antes de cruzar la calle hasta saber cuándo pedir ayuda. Sin embargo, muchos cuidadores

pueden sentirse inseguros sobre cómo hablar de la seguridad corporal de manera apropiada para el desarrollo de los niños pequeños.

Esta sesión está diseñada para generar confianza y claridad en los educadores de la primera infancia. Los participantes aprenderán un lenguaje práctico y apropiado para la edad que ayude a los niños a comprender su cuerpo, reconocer situaciones potencialmente inseguras y utilizar reglas simples de seguridad para pedir ayuda.

Process Art for Adults (Class Capacity 20 Students)

Process art in preschool focuses on the creative process and exploration, rather than the final product. Children are encouraged to experiment, express themselves, and use various materials and techniques without set guidelines. There's no right or wrong way for their art to look, and they're free to explore and decide what they want to create.

Here's what process art looks like in preschool:

Open-ended: There's little to no instruction, and children are in control of what they create.

Child-led: Children choose how and what materials to use, and can come and go from their art as they please.

Exploration and experimentation: Children are encouraged to try different materials and techniques.

Joyful: The focus is on the experience of creating, not the end result.

From Reaction to Regulation: Using SEL-Driven Practices to Support Every Child (and Adults too)

This session focuses on creating proactive, relationship-driven classrooms where social-emotional learning shapes the environment, daily routines, and instructional practices. Participants will examine how adult experiences and beliefs influence

responses to behavior and learn strategies to anticipate student needs, design regulation-supportive spaces, and embed SEL throughout the day.

Understanding Childhood Trauma: ACEs and Resilience

Many children enter early childhood classrooms carrying experiences of trauma that shape how they see the world—and how they respond to it. Trauma can impact brain development and often shows up as behaviors that feel confusing or disproportionate. Have you ever seen a child have a strong reaction to what seemed like a small request? For a child impacted by trauma, even minor stressors can trigger overwhelming responses.

In this session, educators will explore Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) to better understand trauma and its effects on the developing brain. Participants will gain practical insight into why children behave the way they do and, more importantly, how educators can make a meaningful difference. The presentation will focus on developmentally appropriate strategies for teaching coping skills, fostering emotional regulation, and building resilience—empowering educators to support students' growth, safety, and success in the classroom.

Comprendiendo el Trauma Infantil: ACEs y Resiliencia

Presented in Spanish: Muchos niños llegan a nuestras aulas de educación temprana cargando experiencias de trauma que moldean cómo ven el mundo y cómo responden a él. El trauma puede afectar el desarrollo del cerebro y, a menudo, se manifiesta en comportamientos que pueden resultar confusos o desproporcionados. ¿Alguna vez ha visto a un niño tener una gran reacción ante una solicitud que parecía pequeña? Para un niño afectado por el trauma, incluso factores estresantes menores pueden desencadenar respuestas abrumadoras.

En esta sesión, los educadores explorarán las Experiencias Adversas en la Infancia (ACEs, por sus siglas en inglés) para comprender mejor el trauma y sus efectos en el cerebro en desarrollo. Round Table Networking for 0 - 18 Months

Round Table Networking for 0–18 Months is a collaborative session designed for early childhood professionals working with infants and young toddlers. Participants will engage in open discussion, share experiences, and exchange practical strategies

related to care, development, and classroom practices for children 0 to 18 months. This interactive round table provides an opportunity to connect with peers, reflect on challenges, and gain new ideas and resources to support high-quality infant and toddler care.

Round Table Networking for 18 - 36 Months

Round Table Networking for 18–36 Months is an interactive session designed for early childhood professionals working with toddlers. Participants will engage in collaborative discussion, share experiences, and exchange practical strategies related to development, behavior, and classroom practices for children 18 to 36 months.
